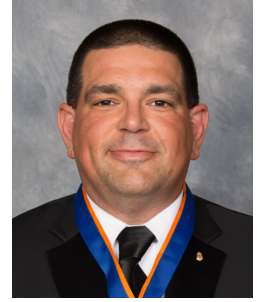

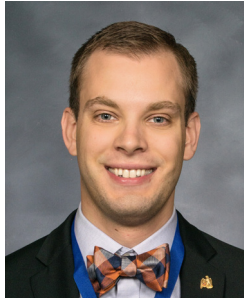

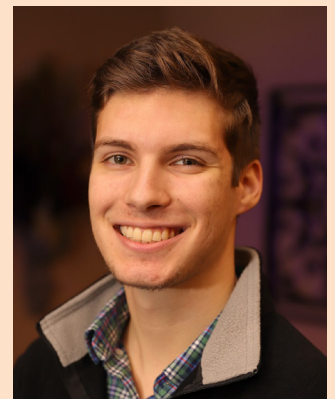

# 2022 *Ordo Honoris* Nominations Request

EVERY OTHER YEAR at the National Convention, Kappa Delta Rho recognizes its outstanding alumni for their lifelong achievements and bestows upon them our Fraternity's highest honor — the *Ordo Honoris*. Once again, we are asking the leaders of our Chapters and alumni corporations, National Board of Directors, Foundation Trustees and individual Brothers to submit nominations for the *Ordo Honoris*.

## How the process works...

Selection for *Ordo Honoris* rests in the hands of one's peers. Chapters, alumni corporations, national Board of Directors, Foundation Trustees or individual Brothers submit nominations for induction into *Ordo Honoris*. The *Ordo Honoris* Selection Committee receives the names of the nominees and their biographies to review, and makes the final selections.

The National Fraternity President will notify recipients that the *Ordo Honoris* medal and plaque will be conferred upon them on August 4th, at the *Ordo Honoris* banquet at the conclusion of the 2022 Williams Leadership Academy and National Convention in Lexington, Kentucky.

## History of the *Ordo Honoris*

As the history of The National Fraternity of Kappa Delta Rho, Inc., grows, we recognize alumni for notable achievements. Until 1982, there was no formal way to recognize these alumni. Outstanding alumni achievements took the form of an occasional biography in the *Quill & Scroll*, or a personal appearance at a National Convention. KDR, with the encouragement of Donald L. Stohl, Zeta '54, corrected this lack of formal recognition by founding the *Ordo Honoris*. The general idea of the National Board of Directors was to establish a Hall of Fame for distinguished alumni.

## NATIONAL OFFICE

In 1980, shortly after becoming executive director, Donald L. Stohl wanted the Fraternity to formally recognize the impressive achievements of alumni members. Brother Stohl also saw the opportunity for these outstanding achievements to serve as an inspiration for current and future members. Many *Ordo Honoris* recipients have indicated that KDR made an early and lasting impression, which helped them in their personal and professional development. An important factor, however, was the term Hall of Fame, which conveyed the general idea of what the National Board of Directors wanted to accomplish. The term, dull and overused, was less desirable, however. Instead, the Board sought to find a meaningful term to recognize outstanding alumni.

The obvious path was to follow the tradition of the KDR Ritual and Ceremonies derived from the model of the ancient Roman Republic. From the suggestion of a Benedictine monk at the Archabbey of St. Vincent College in Latrobe, Pennsylvania, the National Board of Directors decided on the distinction of *Ordo Honoris* (Order of Honor), the honor given to Roman citizens for their contributions to state and community.

On August 14, 1982, the first class of inductees received the official citation, "Brother we salute you. Being persuaded of your honor, fidelity, and concern for your fellow man, we have caused these letters to be issued . . ." The first class of inductees, designated the Alpha Class, included eighty-one members and recognized notable achievements during the first seventy-five years of KDR's history. At each National Convention, the Fraternity recognizes a new class of select inductees, designated by consecutive letters of the Greek alphabet.

# MENTAL HEALTH FIRST AID TRAINING: *Key Component of Brothers' Keeper*

THE LEADERSHIP OF THE NATIONAL FRATERNITY has made the commitment to increase the mental health resources to support our undergraduate membership. A demonstration of our commitment to providing more mental health resources and support to our Brotherhood was the implementation in 2019 of Mental Health First Aid training for our Chapters. To date we have trained more than 100 Brothers in Mental Health First Aid from 25 Chapters; that represents 75 percent of our Chapters. Our goal is that by the end of the Fall semester we will have an undergraduate Brother trained in every Chapter.

Just as CPR training helps a person with no clinical training assist an individual following a heart attack, Mental Health First Aid training helps a person assist someone experiencing a mental health crisis such as contemplating suicide. In both situations, the goal is to help support an individual

until appropriate professional help arrives. Mental Health First Aiders learn a single 5-step strategy that includes assessing risk, respectfully listening to and supporting the individual in crisis, and identifying appropriate professional help and other supports. Participants are also introduced to risk factors and warning signs for mental health or substance use problems, engage in experiential activities that build understanding of the impact of illness on individuals and families, and learn about evidence-supported treatment and self-help strategies.

This training provides our undergraduates with how to apply the 5-step action plan in a variety of situations, such as helping someone through a panic attack, engaging with someone who may be suicidal, or assisting an individual who has overdosed. An important component of the Mental Health First Aid course is the opportunity to practice the intervention strategy rather than just to learn about it. This simple experience can make it easier to apply the knowledge in a real-life situation.

## Kappa Delta Rho Lifeline Making an Impact

IN 2019 THE NATIONAL FRATERNITY of Kappa Delta Rho launched the Kappa Delta Rho Lifeline, an online mental health resource center adapted from The Jed Foundation's U Lifeline website, which demonstrates the Fraternity's commitment to greater mental health awareness, accurate education, and appropriate treatment resources. Since its launch the site has had more than 3,400 unique pageviews. More important, 130 Brothers used the "Get Help Now" feature and 55 Brothers utilized the "Help A Friend" feature.

Lifeline is part of a collaboration with The Jed Foundation (JED)—a leading non-profit organization that exists to protect the emotional health and prevent suicide for our nation's teens and young adults, led by Brother John MacPhee, Nu Alpha '89.

"Many college students will experience periods of emotional distress and mental health challenges, and among college students, it is less common for men to seek help when they are struggling," said John MacPhee, CEO of JED. "We are pleased to see a national fraternal organization like Kappa Delta Rho supporting their members' well-being and empowering them to know when and how help themselves and each other with resources like Kappa Delta Rho Lifeline."

Kappa Delta Rho Past National President, Eugene L. Spencer, Iota '76 believes, "As our Brothers' Keeper, we should be aware of possible warning signs and subtle calls for help. We do not have to be mental health professionals to recognize someone else's difficulties or our own and seek assistance. We cannot stand idly by and expect that Brothers struggling with mental health issues such as depression, anxiety, or substance abuse will ask for help or resolve these issues on their own. A Brotherhood means that we support each other, and we put a hand out to those Brothers who need it; we do not wait to be asked or invited. Sometimes, the request for help doesn't come and the impact of the death of a Brother on everyone whose life he touched is profound, and forever."

All Brothers—both undergraduate and alumni—are encouraged to review the Lifeline site [kappadeltarho.ulifeline.org/](http://kappadeltarho.ulifeline.org/). By knowing what tools and resources are available, the Brothers can act quickly and confidently when they recognize a Brother in need. Lifeline is a resource that will truly help all Brothers be their Brothers' Keeper.

# DESTIGMATIZING MENTAL HEALTH

ONE IN FOUR COLLEGE STUDENTS have a diagnoseable mental illness, with depression and anxiety being the most common. According to The American College Health Association, in the past year 34.8 percent of male-identifying college students reported that they felt so depressed it was hard to function, 49.1 percent had overwhelming anxiety, and 11.3 percent seriously considered suicide. Mental health issues are on the rise especially as the COVID-19 pandemic continues and suicide is the second-leading cause of death among 15–24-year-old male-identifying students.

Seeking help can feel like a big hurdle when it comes to treating mental illness. According to the National Alliance on Mental Illness, approximately 37.4 percent of the male-identifying population receives mental health treatment annually with rates lowest among the non-Hispanic Asian population. Untreated mental illness takes a significant toll on individuals and society.

But seeking treatment isn't always easy. Not only is there a critical shortage of mental health providers in the United States, but there still exists a stigma in some groups against seeking mental health treatment and talking about mental health, and it is vital to break down this stigma.

It's important to recognize that the strongest stigma that you are likely facing is from yourself. Fear that others will think less of you if you seek mental health treatment is very common. However, over the past two decades, society's understanding and attitude about mental health has markedly changed and it's likely that you will receive support from your community, family and friends. Mental health struggles do not make anyone weak, less masculine, or less capable. On the contrary, it takes tremendous strength to ask for help.

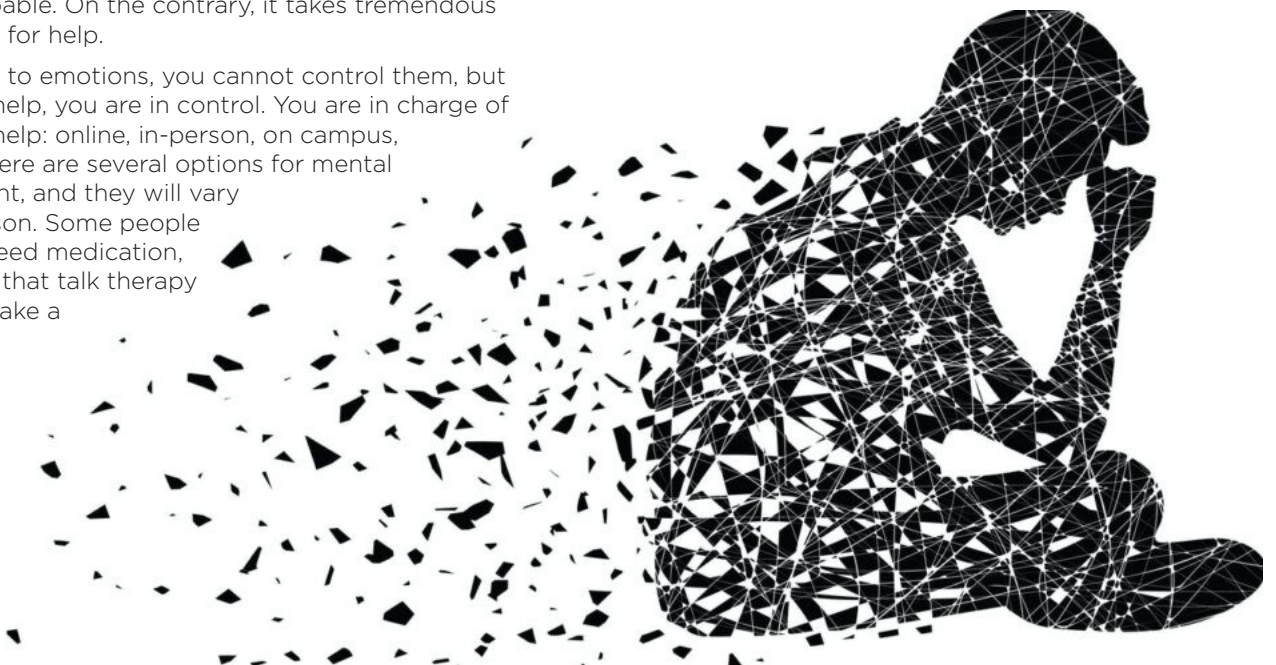
When it comes to emotions, you cannot control them, but when seeking help, you are in control. You are in charge of how you seek help: online, in-person, on campus, off campus. There are several options for mental health treatment, and they will vary person to person. Some people will find they need medication, but many find that talk therapy is enough to make a difference.

You can start by seeing your regular doctor or calling your insurance carrier. You can visit the KDR Lifeline at [kappadeltarho.ulifeline.org](http://kappadeltarho.ulifeline.org) where you can utilize the self-evaluator tool and find campus-specific resources to get started.

Remember that emotions are universal and being ashamed of your emotions reinforces the stigma around seeking help. Many people mask their emotions and push their feelings down and try to ignore them. But eventually those feelings will float to the surface and force you to deal with them. Mental health is just as important as physical health. Untreated mental illness increases the risk of substance abuse, cardiovascular disease, and many other issues. Think about the time you spend in the gym maintaining your physical body. The mind has maintenance needs that are just as important. Meeting all your needs helps you to meet your goals and get what you want out of life.

The final hurdle is to share your story. Once you reach out and you're ready, share your story of that time you needed help and reached out for it. Personal experiences from those we admire and trust have the biggest impact breaking down the stigma when it comes to mental health, encouraging others to seek help when they need it.





# Let's Do This Idea of Fraternity... Differently

FOR THE 2021-2022 ACADEMIC YEAR, we have two expansion projects at Virginia Tech and at UNC Greensboro. As the initial expansion phase at Virginia Tech ends, we will start the process at UNC Greensboro during the Spring semester.

## ANTI-FRATERNITY EXPERIENCE

When the Anti-Fraternity experience was first presented to me by our partners at Phired Up, I was taken aback and confused. Why would I market the Anti-Fraternity experience if I want men to join? The Anti-Fraternity experience is utilizing a different philosophy from traditional recruitment practices. We must shift the way we recruit the next generation of KDR Gentleman. Some of the differences include having 1:1 meaningful interaction with potential new members (PNMs), utilizing resources to manage PNMs, and emphasizing the "Why KDR" experience.

## VIRGINIA TECH

After the first semester the men at Virginia Tech obtained Provisional Chapter status. Currently standing strong at 29 members, the Chapter has a goal of becoming fully chartered by the end of the Spring 2022 semester. Aside from recruitment the Chapter was able to excel in many fraternal areas including academics and philanthropy efforts. With an average GPA of 3.23, the Chapter was ranked

5th out of 25 IFC Organizations. The Chapter also raised more than \$2,500 for the B+ Foundation and our Brothers' Keeper Initiative.

Currently, Virginia Tech has 25 IFC organizations that are vastly different, but similar to KDR. How do we stand out? Why would a student join KDR when they have the option to join 24 other established organizations? Three things that helped the Gamma Beta Provisional Chapter be successful were:

1. Being different than every other organization on campus. This sounds very cliché but having that mindset transcended the Chapter's success with recruitment and fraternal operations.
2. "If you treat him like a Brother, he will become a Brother. If you treat him like a number, he probably won't join, and if he does, he probably won't stick around."
3. #INITIATIVE—This quickly became a buzzword to describe the good and bad moments of the semester.

I will leave you with this when asked "Why KDR" the Consul from Virginia Tech said, "KDR offered a unique experience to bond with a close-knit Brotherhood who share the common goal to make a difference."

# A Brother Who Served Well

KAPPA DELTA RHO LOST an exemplary scholar and man of the Classics when Brother Martin Dewey Joachim, Jr., 82, died in August 2021 in Bloomington, Indiana. His is a story of a Brother helping Brothers.

Countless men who were Nu Chapter undergraduates when Marty (Nu '61) served as scholarship advisor throughout the 1960s and beyond, attribute their academic successes—and ability to graduate—to his calm, encouraging, sometimes prodding, manner. He helped hundreds of men in need of crafting a persuasive English sentence, understanding a professor's seemingly unclear assignment, and approaching other Brothers for their advanced expertise, but, most important of all, he led undergraduates in learning how to devote time and effort to study. On the lighter side, he possessed a whimsical sense of humor and seemingly always had time for Bridge.

A native of Indianapolis, Marty earned his BA in Classics and MA in Library Science from Indiana University (IU). He began academic advising of undergraduates by overseeing study table and privately meeting with those who needed special assistance. These comments are typical:

"Having finished my first semester with a GPA of 2.06 (4.0 scale), I was in dire straits. Marty tutored me and ensured my continuity at IU. I was able to finish my four years."

"Coming from a blue-collar rural community I had little knowledge of the academic rigors that college would demand. I was a freshman ... and had failing grades at the mid-semester break. He kind of adopted me and guided me scholastically through my freshman year."

"After throwing a big pot of cold water on Marty in the shower, I surrendered my pledge book. It came back the next day with a twenty-page essay in Greek, Latin, and English: Twenty-five centuries of quotes about water, annotated to warn me against a repeat."

"He quietly led by examples of tolerance, humility, and as a scholar in graduate programs of Greek/Latin Studies among others. Marty was a guiding light in the success of the house while we were there. His mantra was to have fun while respecting others and succeeding with your studies. That is how he lived his life."

"He volunteered to read my papers. I assumed he'd



help me write them and perhaps even dictate sentences.... Wrong! He graded my papers as a professor would with notations like wrong tense, misspelling, not clear, be concise, wrong word, needs paragraph break, etc. ...; when I'd ask what he would suggest, 'You figure it out' was his gentle but firm reply. Without his coaching and mentoring I doubt I would have returned for my sophomore year. I roomed with (him one semester) and ... got my one and only 4-point (GPA)!"

Reserved and self-effacing, Marty spoke volumes in his actions of helping others. His work for the Chapter (which also included more than thirty years as the Nu alumni corporation's secretary/treasurer) has led Nu alumni to launch a campaign to establish an endowed scholarship in his name at the KDR Foundation, available to Nu undergraduates and graduates.

Marty worked his entire career in the cataloging department of the Indiana University Bloomington libraries and received the title Librarian Emeritus upon retirement. Possessing the ability to speak or read multiple languages, he translated the contents of books in Greek, Latin, and the modern Romance languages and wrote the text for card catalogs. His work reached library users throughout the world. Elizabeth Johnson, the now-retired head of Technical Services for IU's rare books library, Lilly Library, first knew Marty at IU libraries. She described him as "a joy to have because of his work ethic." He was "fastidious ... and had extraordinary language abilities." Johnson called him a leader in the worldwide standardization of electronic cataloging rules and methods. As "Senior Cataloger" for the

university's main library of more than 4.6 million volumes, Marty taught other librarians about proper cataloging in a rapidly changing world.

Additionally, he edited two books.

For at least nine years after retirement, according to one article, he devoted "thousands of hours" to Lilly Library. He specialized in reading and cataloging books printed prior to 1501. The article stated, "He estimates that 75% of the incunabula are in Latin. The remainder are mostly in Italian, French, German, Greek, and Spanish with an occasional work in English." Library Director Joel Silver said there were about 700 such books.

Marty's interests were wide-ranging and to many, fascinating. He could be as comfortable at a Hoosiers' basketball game as at a Jacobs School of Music opera. He collected books, stamps, art, pottery, and movies and traveled internationally. He was a gourmet cook, daily practitioner of New York Times crossword puzzles, and for mindless enjoyment watched Days of Our Lives on television as often as possible.

Kappa Delta Rho is a special Brotherhood that forges lifelong relationships and Brothers helping Brothers. For many, Marty Joachim was a paragon of such a man, using his multiple talents to assist not only his Brothers but the world at large.

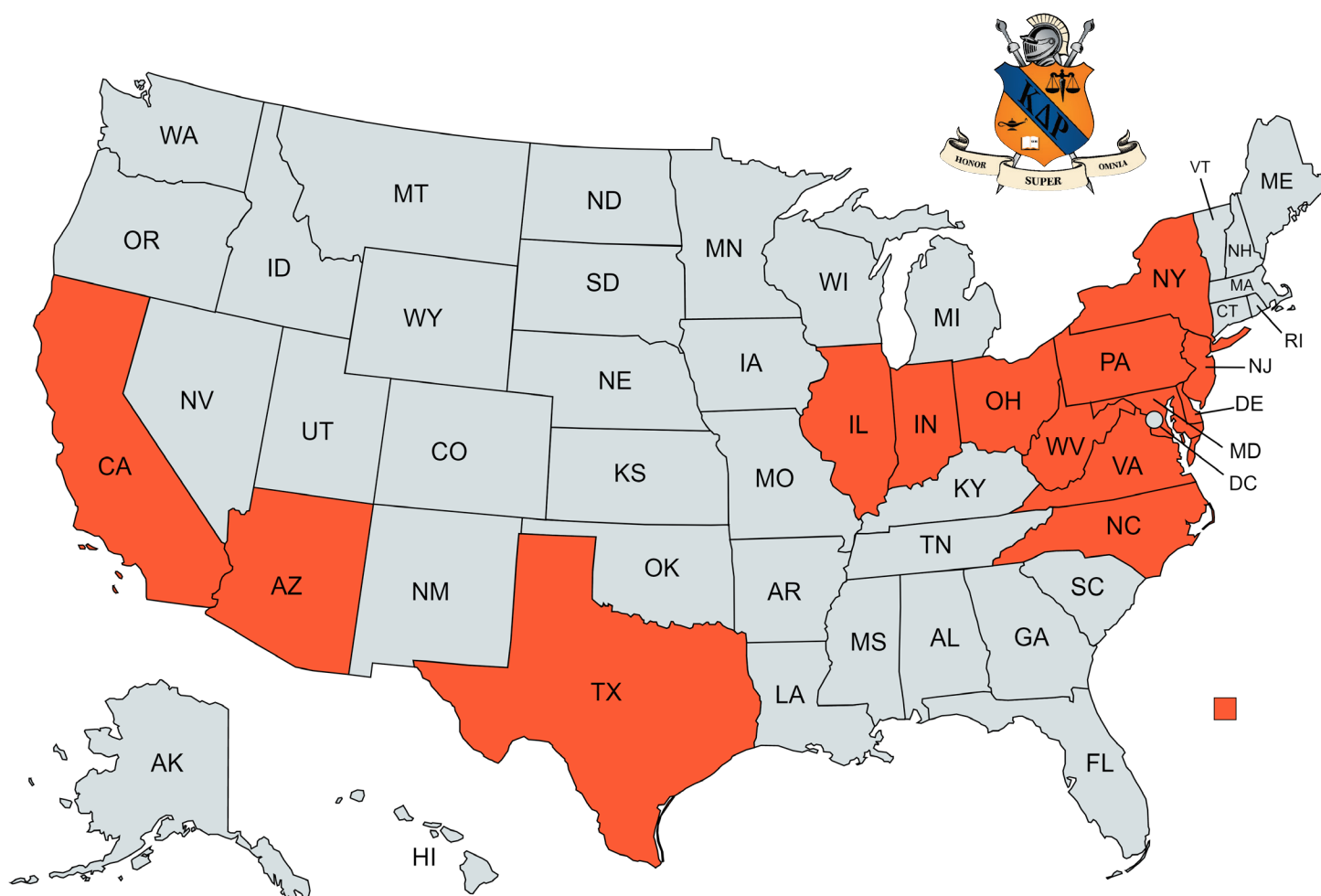


Recolonization at Sigma Beta, University of North Carolina Greensboro will kick off this spring.

## The National Fraternity of Kappa Delta Rho, Inc. RISK MANAGEMENT POLICY (Adopted August 28, 2019)

### ALCOHOL AND DRUGS

In any activity or event sponsored or endorsed by the [chapter/organization], including those that occur on or off [organizational/chapter] premises:

(1) The [organization,] members, and guests must comply with all federal, state, provincial, and local laws. No person under the legal drinking age may possess, consume, provide, sell or be provided alcoholic beverages.

(2) [Organizations,] members, and guests must follow the federal law regarding illegal drugs and controlled substances. No person may possess, use, provide, distribute, sell, and/or manufacture illegal drugs or other controlled substances while on [organizational/chapter] premises or at any activity or event sponsored or endorsed by the [chapter/organization].

(3) Alcoholic beverages must either be: (1) provided and sold on a per-drink basis by a licensed and insured third-party vendor (e.g., restaurant, bar, caterer, etc.); or (2) brought by individual members and guests through a bring your own beverage ("BYOB") system.

(4) The presence of alcohol products above 15% alcohol by volume ("ABV") is prohibited on any [organizational] premises or at any event, except when served at an event by a licensed and insured third-party vendor.

(5) Common sources of alcohol, including bulk quantities, which are not being served by a licensed and insured third party vendor, are prohibited (i.e., amounts of alcohol greater than what a reasonable person should consume over the duration of an event).

(6) Alcoholic beverages must not be purchased with [organizational] funds or funds pooled by members or guests (e.g., admission fees, cover fees, collecting funds through digital apps, etc.).

(7) An [chapter/organization] must not co-host or cosponsor, or in any way participate in, an activity or event with another group or entity that purchases or provides alcohol, illegal drugs or controlled substances.

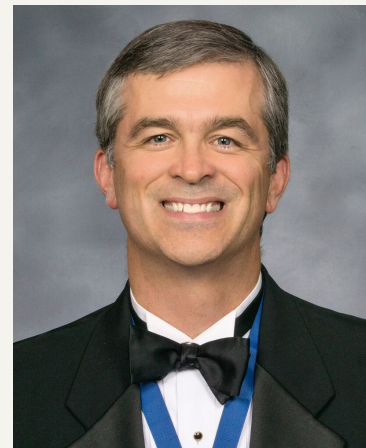
(8) An [chapter/organization] must not co-host or cosponsor an event with a bar, event promoter, or alcohol distributor; however, a [chapter/organization] may rent a bar, restaurant, or other licensed and insured third-party vendor to host a chapter event.

We need to be "all in" to make this \$2.5M campaign successful. Thus far, over \$1.35M in commitments have been received from supportive undergraduates, alumni, and parents. We know there are many alumni that are pondering their level to commit to the effort. The Kappa Delta Rho Foundation, through scholarships and educational grants, provides our Brotherhood a portion of the resources necessary successfully to navigate the college experience. "Our primary goal is to raise money to fund the efforts of the national organization.... Some of it is the day-to-day stuff, paying office staff, paying the leadership Consultants, getting people on the road. Then some of it is much bigger endeavors—We're trying to endow a campaign called Brothers' Keeper. Especially in times like now, where there's a lot of feeling of isolation and depression and the like ... just given the world and quarantine and its effect on people's psyches, this is an opportune time for a program to help mental health. It's something we just didn't have—and the Fraternal world doesn't have. We're kind of cutting edge on



this. It's certainly an issue that's becoming more and more relevant."

Scott's commitment to the betterment of the Fraternity is exactly the meaning of Brotherhood. A community of men like Scott having dedicated time out of their busy schedules to continue to promote the success of our undergraduate body along with Brothers to come is what makes Kappa Delta Rho so great. Scott's story exemplifies how taking initiative in one's Chapter and "striving to lead" are a great way to build the necessary skills to achieve success in not only one's career, but also in one's life. He is proud of his work and the lifelong bonds with Brothers that span years. When asked his vision on how he hopes to make Kappa Delta Rho a better Fraternity as a Trustee for The Foundation, this is what he had to say:

"Anything that you do of any worth—you get back what you put into it. I'm getting a sense that I'm furthering the objectives and the ideals of my Fraternity. I'm ensuring, especially being on the Trustee side, that we will have the financial wherewithal in the future to get things done. It's really the give-back that I get out of it"

# KDR RISES TO THE CHALLENGES

KAPPA DELTA RHO HAS ENDURED nearly two years of uncertainty and vagueness that COVID brought our way. Although we are not out of the woods yet, I have been genuinely inspired by our undergraduate members, alumni, parents/friends of KDR, the National Office Staff, and everyone's ability to remain resilient.

KDR has risen to the challenge of “external circumstances” and “how we respond to them” so our Fraternity can continue to succeed and grow in these times. Some of the items I have witnessed firsthand include:

- In November 2021, we participated in our seventh annual ‘GivingTuesday’ fundraiser, where we raised just over \$28,000 from 51 donors. We have come a long way from 2015, where gifts totaled just over \$3,000.
- In October 2021, I attended the chartering of the Kappa Chapter at The Ohio State University. Kappa has 66 Brothers now, and most of this effort occurred during the pandemic. What was so amazing to me was the undergraduate members and alumni from Kappa and Pi Alpha who came together to make this a reality.

- In June 2021, we closed out the fiscal year and raised just under \$124,000, which was our 13th best year in the 26-year Annual Fund History.

As we near the halfway point for our fiscal year, I'm reminded of an article by then Foundation President, Thomas V. McComb, Nu '59, from the Spring/Summer 2006 *Quill & Scroll* where he asked “each of you (17,500 living alumni) who have not made a financial commitment to your Fraternity to do so. Four thousand (4,000) additional alumni donors at a modest \$25 each would produce \$100,000 of additional funding annually—funding that is needed by your Fraternity to provide critical undergraduate programming, leadership training, and Chapter development”.

Or, in today's words, please help KDR continue to be resilient.
