

Jerry Murray, Theta '66: Putting honor first

On November 16, 2022, KDR Brother Gerald "Jerry" Murray, Theta '66, passed into Chapter Eternal. Before recently becoming a Foundation Trustee, Jerry was one of the longest-serving members of the National Board of Directors. He generously endowed the firstever needs-based Foundation National Scholarship to benefit current and future Brothers of Theta Chapter at Purdue University, served as the director at Kappa Delta Rho from 1974 to 2016, served as secretary from 1988 to 2016, and is the namesake of the National Award for Outstanding Chapter Operations. His academic and career achievements are equally storied and (almost) too extensive to mention, but the legacy Jerry left is much bigger than any of those accomplishments. Those who knew him best remember a man who embodied Honor Super Omnia.

"When I heard Honor Super Omnia when I was pledging, I thought it meant put KDR first, but it really meant to put your honor first," Brian Dilts, Theta '84, said. "And Jerry did an excellent job of that. He did the right things. You trusted everything that he said. It was amazing how he lived by putting honor first. He lived it day in and day out. He was a great guy."

Dilts says that when he joined Theta Chapter at

Purdue in 1979, Jerry was on the alumni board and it seemed like he had been there "forever." In reality, Murray had joined the Board of Directors in 1967, and in 1974 was also elected to the National Fraternity Board of Directors. He would serve at both his local chapter and at the national level until his death 43 years later.

"People came to rely on his good judgment," **Phil Reber, Theta' 86** said. "He was very well respected."

Reber followed Murray as president of the board for Theta Chapter and says that he learned a lot from him. "He taught me how to look at the long term instead of just the short term — what impact will this decision have in 10 years? He really had vision and foresight."

His daughters Andrea Watts and Abby Slye said that his quiet, steady vision and selflessness could be seen in everything that he did. "He lived a life of service," Abby said. "He was generally very quiet and not flashy. Every week, his church held a meal for the community, and while other people cooked or served, my dad washed dishes. It was not glamorous but it was necessary, so that was what he did."

The sisters said that while he generously

served in numerous roles, giving back to KDR had a deeper meaning for their father. "It's important to understand exactly how transformational KDR was to our father," Abby said. "He grew up with limited means and didn't even have indoor plumbing until 5th grade. College was a totally foreign concept for his family. When he got to Purdue, it seemed like such a big place. KDR became a place for him to make connections, have social support, and find a family away from home. It even gave him a way to support himself by working in the kitchen in the basement."

"KDR set him up for an amazing future that might not have been possible otherwise,"

"KDR set him up for an amazing future that might not have been possible otherwise," she added. "I think that's the reason he remained so involved. He wanted to support others who were coming, in hopes of transforming their lives too."

Murray was born on March 28, 1944, in New Castle, Indiana, and grew up in the small town of Spiceland. He graduated from Purdue University in 1966 with a B.A. in Social Studies Education, then received an M.A. from Ball State University in 1968.

Ten years later, he earned an M.S. in Industrial Psychology from Purdue and later his Ed.D. in Higher Education and Counseling from the University of Virginia in 1981. And every step of the way, he infused his love of learning and transformational leadership into the next generation of KDRs.

"At a young age, KDR gave him the opportunity to learn leadership and be part of something bigger than himself," Andrea said. "Those transferable skills were so huge to him. He put those skills to use before he ever graduated, and used them for the rest of his life."

The leadership that he gained during his undergraduate years steered him for the next half of a century and beyond.

"He was the most extroverted introvert there ever was," his daughters remember. "He had the ability to be a leader by being quiet and listening, respecting other viewpoints, and offering subtle direction and steadfast processes. He showed all of us that you don't have to be loud and pushy to lead."

This year, there is a new generation of KDRs who have not benefited from Jerry Murray's quiet visionary leadership, but those who knew him well offered suggestions on what advice he might offer them.

"In the context of college, he would tell people to get involved. Be part of the brotherhood," Abby Slye said. "What's going to make your experiences really rich is to get involved. Meet people you would have never met otherwise. Never stop learning. Keep doing that."

"I think he would say give back, and support the place," Brian Dilts added. "The payback is unbelievable."



Roy Jackman, lota '47:

"I was an only child who found my family at KDR"

On October 24, 2022, Roy Jackman, lota '47, passed into Chapter Eternal, His Brothers at Bucknell and across the national organization join together in remembering a man who lived out KDR's credo throughout difficult times in the world and in his own Chapter. And Roy, who grew up as an only child, died at the age of 98

with a Brotherhood who had surrounded him with camaraderie and memories throughout the postwar college years, throughout his career and long into his retirement.

Roy enrolled at Bucknell University before the war, but left in 1942 to join the Army Air Corps. By the time he came back in 1946, his class was graduating and Bucknell was drastically different.

"Most males on campus had been in the service," he remembered in an interview recorded when he was 90 (you can view the footage here). Very few women enrolled in 1946 and 1947 — the spaces were all taken up by servicemen trying to graduate. The average age of students was much higher, and most were more mature and focused on getting an education. Of course a few felt like they had to make up for lost

After the war, Iota Chapter had a grand total of 7 returning actives. They no longer owned a

house — even their cookstove was in storage. But they purchased a building that had been a rooming house and the number soon grew to 50. Roy was one of those new Brothers.

"Every night all the Brothers ate together — we wore jackets and ties, and said grace. Afterwards, a few of us would gather around the piano and sing."

The camaraderie helped the group, made up of 90% veterans, readapt to college life. That first year, they won an award for the highest scholastic achievement. Over the next few years Roy served as the social chair, then treasurer, then president.

It was during those years that the undergrads had a dream of building the "KDR house on the hill." As a group of seasoned war veterans, they cobbled together \$2,000 — no small feat in the late '40s before reaching out to the alumni. "If we can do this, you can do more," Roy said that they told them. "And they did. We used that money to pay off the mortgage of the makeshift boarding house, hired an architect and started looking at building the house on the hill."

Fortuitously, the two KDR advisors were part of engineering and university planning respectively, so KDR soon had help with choosing an ideal spot for the house and started to build. Roy was integral in seeing the project to fruition, and stayed involved with the Chapter for the next several decades.

"He would show at every Homecoming," Gene Spencer lota '76, remembers. "He wasn't in your face or demanding — he just showed up. During my senior year, I was president and had a conversation with him. That's when I truly understood how much he supported the Chapter. He'd spent most of his life just showing up — he embodied the concept that KDR is

to be built. KDR was told that Bucknell would purchase the "house on the hill" and build a new home for the Iota Chapter.

"When we recharted in 2012, we had a celebration at a local restaurant. He looked out the window and said, 'That's where the first KDR house was.' He found a quiet way of keeping us connected to our history," Gene

Gary Buchmann '79 was alumni president of the Iota Chapter when it was recolonized in 2012. He remembers that Roy and his wife would come back to the house every year. "He always had such great insights and remembered so much of the history of the Chapter," he said. "He always said that KDR had made a influencing new Brothers with his quiet wisdom. great impact on his life."

"He and his good friend Flovd Taylor '49 had such great memories of having a piano in the house, and they went together to purchase a new piano for the new Chapter house. A few Brothers would play music on it, and it brought back memories of how the lota Chapter would have been in the '40s," Gary added.

"Rather than trying to force that memory on us, he thought that the new actives would like to experience them too, and he funded it," Gene added. "It wasn't him forcing his values on us, it was him finding a connection between his values and those bubbling up in the organization."

Roy met his wife Shirley at Bucknell, and the pair had 71 years together. Upon graduation, Roy began a 40-year career in Casualty Insurance Underwriting, first at The London G & A as an underwriting trainee and then with Ohio Casualty Group (now Liberty Mutual) in 1956, where he spent the next 34 years.

Throughout the next decades, Roy continued to remain engaged with Iota Chapter, along with national. "The most important thing that KDR gave to me was the fellowship of the group," Roy said in his archive interview. "We were truly like Brothers. I was an only child and I was truly part of a family at KDR."

And he stayed involved over the decades,

"I think he stayed involved for the same reasons that I've staved involved — being in the Fraternity means being a Brother for life. It becomes a lifelong commitment. We all have a love for KDR and want to support it," Gary said.

"There is a part of the KDR credo that says. Their reward has been the Inspiration of their Youth: the Driving Power of their Manhood; the Memories of their Maturity. They have fought the good Fight and of these, my sons, I am justly proud," Gene added. "I think it was a great reflection of Roy. He was active in his membership during crazy times, and he fought the good fight."

RETROSPECTIVE, Sigma Scoop 2021

BENNY BEAVER (OSU) 6 OSKI (CAL/BERKELEY)

Two KDRs, 15 years apart, performed as their university mascot

KDRs Dennis Linnell, 80-644 (Sigma), and David Sharon (Lambda) both served as their respective mascots or their universities. Both had memorable experiences and long associations with their mascot.

Many of us from the late 1970's and early 1980's remember that Dennis was Benny Beaver for a year, even making an appearance in the House photo of Sigma Chapter. Similarly, David Sharon was Oski the Bear for Berkeley for about three years in the late 1960's and, as a former Oski, maintains contact with the Oski program at Berkeley to this day. Both had stories to tell about hijinks that occurred during their tenures as their university mascots.

Here's some things you may not know about the mascot programs at OSU and Berkeley:

- Benny Beaver was part of OSU's cheer squad, while Oski was a stand-alone program at Berkeley;
- Both mascot programs required the mascot to be athletic enough to keep up with the mascot duties

 Dennis had to try out for Benny Beaver and relied on his personal fitness to compete. David had been on the Berkeley wrestling squad and left after a training accident forced an end to his wrestling career. While OSU had tryouts for Benny Beaver, the Oski committee recruited athletes for Oski: and
- Both mascot positions had more than one mascot to fulfill the duties of mascot (2 Benny Beavers, 5-7 Oskis).

Dennis said worked out with the cheerleaders almost everyday to get ready for the games. He frequently Benny Beavered at the football games, when OSU students went primarily to drink and watch OSU lose— Benny Beaver was a main attraction. During the basketball games it was different story. Dennis said there were a couple of incidents where Benny was verbally abused at basketball games when Benny's big head blocked the action on the court. This was during the Ralph Miller coaching days. Benny's



presence was diminished. At an Oregon football game, one of the students ripped Benny's tail off and ran away with it.

One of the football coaches intercepted the student thief as he tried to escape. One time, Dennis travelled to Cal to put on the Benny suit for a game, but the suit was missing — Benny didn't perform. After the game was over, the Benny suit

mysteriously reappeared.

Being the dedicated Beaver Believer that he was (and still is) Dennis requested and got permission from OSU to donned the Benny suit about 20 years later for OSU's Basketball team playing in the Great Alaska Shootout.

David's tenure occurred during a tumultuous time at Berkeley—there were school sit ins and students took over the administration building on campus. Despite the student protests in the mid and late 1960s, the Oski Program continued to be as popular as ever. There were between five & seven Oskis to perform at games. In those days, the Spirit Committee (yes, there was a committee to guide Oski's performance) had a shop to build sets for Oski's performance skits at the Cal games. Some of the skits would be considered inappropriate today, but in the late 1960's it was done for entertainment for the Cal fans. Some skits were so risqué that the Athletic Director (AD) had a meeting with the Oskis to curtail the more objectionable skits. Because there was more than one Oski, the offending Oski could not be identified—so all received "counseling" from the AD. The skits continued for awhile, with some venturing into what most would say were "politically-incorrect," but were generally accepted as okay at the time. Eventually, Cal stopped the skits and the skits shop was closed.

David said there was a game where they were visiting Oregon and Oski and the Duck got into a playful wrestling match on the field. At a Washington Huskies game, fans threw a fishing net over Oski and dragged him off the court. Stanford fans always threw things at Oski, bordering on violent. During David's time as Oski, the mascot traveled to Stanford games with security guards.



What Are EXECUTIVE FUNCTIONING SKILLS?

Executive function, weak executive function skills, these words are all over the internet, especially social media. But what exactly is executive functioning, why is it important, and how can you improve yours?

Executive functions are several mental processes that help us to plan, focus attention, remember instructions, and multitask. Basically, as the traffic control of the brain, executive functions allow us to filter out internal and external distraction, set priorities and follow through, organize tasks and get started, and control our impulses, to name a few. Three specific types of brain functions are essential for executive functioning: working memory, mental flexibility, and self-control. Executive function develops over time as the brain matures and there are number of developmental and environmental issues that can interfere with the development of these skills. Environmental stressors, adverse childhood experiences, developmental disorders such as ADHD and Autism Spectrum Disorder are some of the issues that can interfere with development of strong executive function skills.

Weak executive function skills can interfere with memory, especially working memory, organization, impulse control, planning and follow through, time management, and emotional regulation. Weaknesses in executive function are invisible but can have a profound impact on relationships, self-esteem, education, and career development.

So how do you strengthen executive function skills? First, remember that the brain is not fully developed at age 18. According to the National Institutes of Health, the brain is not fully developed until our mid-to-late 20s. Major developmental change continues to occur between the ages of 18-25, well beyond the traditional age of graduation from higher education. Secondly, strengthening executive function isn't a one size fits all program. If one approach doesn't work for you, try another. The important thing is finding a system that works for you and understanding that this system will need to be changed and adjusted as your needs change.

Some of the most common approaches to strengthening executive function include using planner systems, and reminder systems including on phone and other smart devices. An important piece to remember with executive function issues is that usually out of sight equals out of mind. Therefore most people with executive function challenges find visual systems that frequently change (to avoid mind blindness) to be useful.

Time blindness, difficulty with estimating the passage of time, estimating how long something will take or last, and difficulty estimating how long before something occurs, is a frequent issue for people with weak executive function skills. Developing a deliberate system to manage time, such as visual timers, countdown clock systems, breaking down demands according to time sensitivity such as "critical", "urgent", and "not urgent" can be helpful.

Get your brain and body active. Brain games, especially those that encourage mental flexibility and impulse control help to improve executive function. According to the National Institutes of Health (2021), sports, especially open skill sports, in which the environment is always changing, improve executive functions especially cognitive flexibility and behavior inhibition.

Get support. Dealing with weak executive function skills can be frustrating, and can feel isolating, especially for adults. Seeking help and support from others who have similar struggles can help you not feel alone. This type of support can give you access to other ideas and strategies such as body doubling-sitting in the same location as another person completing a task, to help both people get things done.

Understanding executive functioning is still a developing field. While the idea of a central brain control system has been around for centuries, it wasn't until 2013 that the concept of executive functioning as a separate, singular phenomena was first introduced. Future research will continue to define, understand, and develop strategies and interventions to help develop and strengthen executive function skills. Continuing to learn and being open to new ideas, tools, and strategies will be essential for those looking to develop and improve their own executive function skills.

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Remembering Brother Bill Donadee, Z'70

Bill's is a story of an 'allaround good guy' - always fun - who helped others throughout his life. He was known as Willie, William, Bill, Billy, Dago, Wilbur (and other collegiate nicknames). A native of Camp Hill (Harrisburg area), PA, he got along with everybody. He was always a help to his high

school and community friends. His twin sister Pat (Donadee) Warden reminisces, "Bill treated everyone in a manner similar as to how he wanted to be treated. He quietly and without fanfare helped many people along the way. An example of his kindness was buying holiday meals for less fortunate families. He provided affordable housing through his many properties. For some tenants, who could not qualify for conventional loans to buy properties, he helped them with financing so they could enjoy home ownership."

His positive outlook on life, as well as doing good deeds, continued during his collegiate years at Penn State University as a member of Zeta Chapter of Kappa Delta Rho. Bill was introduced to KDRZ by his high school friend, (the late) Charlie Kizlin, a pledge Brother of this author. In the Sixties and early Seventies, Penn State operated on a ten-week term system; three ten-week terms (Fall, Winter, Spring or Summer) equaled the current two semesters of an academic year. By university policy, incoming Freshmen were prohibited from fraternity rush in their first term on campus; therefore, the rushing / pledging period began in Winter term. Bill was one of three pledges in Winter term 1967.

Pledge Brother Steve Moiles '70 recalls Bill as the more out-going of the group, Steve was more reserved. The third person de-pledged shortly thereafter. "Out of necessity, Bill and I developed a working bond and respect; we covered for each other as we endured the presented challenges of the pledge period", recalls Moiles.

Readers of this *Quill & Scroll* periodical all recall incidents – humorous and otherwise – that arose during pledging periods. Moiles continues with his vivid recollection of a Brotherhood bonding event – The Late-Night Drop-Off – including pledge Brother Bill. "We were summoned to the Chapter house one evening late in the term and advised to wear warm clothing and not bring along any money. Our pockets were checked, blindfolds were put on, we were loaded into a car for a trip to an unknown destination in a



mountainous area outside of State College, PA. It was a bonding experience and

a test of wits to see if we could find our way home after being abandoned!"

"Blindfolds were removed, we were outside of the car then the Brothers drove off. We shared our thoughts, gathered our wits and observed a forest and a road leading downhill. Thankfully, it was a clear, but chilly night as we began our journey home. Bill smiled and said we may not be in bad shape, "I hid \$10 in my shoe figuring the Brothers may do something like this." After walking about 20 minutes, we saw a home with an outside light shining. We knocked on the door, an elderly man answered, he allowed us to use his phone to call a taxi. Within 45 minutes we were back in our dorm rooms, warm and content with the feeling that we survived this challenge (and prepared us to get through whatever remained in our pledge period)."

In the Sixties-Seventies, Penn State did not have campus shuttle transportation. For us, it was the 'shoe-leather express'. The Zeta Chapter house was about a one-mile hike to campus, part of our 'enforced exercise' to counterbalance our 'well-rounded diets of foods and beverages'. Many times the walks were communal, a fun time for Brotherly bonding and chats. Several reminiscences follow:

- "Walking to class in the rain, Bill was hopping and skipping around. When asked what he was doing, Bill replied that he was avoiding the raindrops. He was wearing rawhide cowboy boots, he tripped or slipped, crashing onto the sidewalk, eliciting laughter all around", recalls Dan Gomez, '69.
- "I walked to class many times with him and others.
 I fondly recall Bill's positive and happy personality.

 He would sing aloud and literally hop and skip

instead of just walking. He was 'happy' to be around; no grousing, nothing snide nor snarky. He conveyed a healthy sense of humor (and he could dish it out in many ways)," Lou Gorman, '68 said.

 "I recall Bill and I walking back from campus one day, we were being hailed by an elderly neighbor lady whose house was on our street. She asked if we were fraternity guys, and if we could paint her kitchen? A few days later, that's what we did. Bill was handy, he enjoyed doing restoration work on older houses." states Sam Mecum '70.

Bill had a lifelong 'soft spot in his heart' for rescue dogs. During his time in the Zeta Chapter house, Bill had a dog named Jude (named after the Beatles' song 'Hey, Jude'). David Slaybaugh '70 recalls 'dogsitting' for Jude when Bill was not at the house. It was quite an honor to be selected as a dog-sitter (as Bill was very particular that his canine friends were properly cared for in his absence). Bill adopted a series of rescue dogs throughout his life after college – Shadow, Rocky, Sallie. "In fact, all of Bills dogs 'found him'", recalls his sister Pat. He bequeathed a substantial sum to the local Humane Society.

Bill was also an avid student of history. The Civil War era was his lifelong study and passion. Jack Warren '70 fondly recalls Bill's visits on his mini vacations to the Civil War battlefields in western Maryland, Virginia and the Carolinas. "Bill was a walking, talking Civil War history book." Another friend Diane accompanied Bill on many visits and re-enactments at Gettysburg. Once while walking the battlefields, Diane stepped in a gopher hole and twisted her ankle, which prompted Bill to exclaim "Diane was wounded at the battle of Gettysburg!"

Warren continues "Bill was extremely outgoing and knew more people than most at Penn State. He also had a private side of his life. He built his world the way that he wanted it. He always aimed for independence and achieved that in many ways. While his career was with the railroad in Harrisburg and Enola, PA, he also bought run-down houses, fixed them up, then rented them out affordably."

In the Nineties, after retiring from his railroad career, Bill spoke of building "Willie's Steamboat house", a lifelong dream. He designed it and built the lion's share of building. The house sits close to the elevated west bank of the Susquehanna River near Duncannon, PA, which is north of Harrisburg, PA. His accomplishment was chronicled by regional news and TV. Bill was justifiably proud of the finished home. Bill's Mother officiated at the 'christening ceremony.'

Many of the '70 Zeta alums (and a handful of '60's) who remain active in the Zeta Alumni corporation were

instrumental in the Chapter house renovation project in 2007 and thereafter appreciate that Bill actively gave of his time and talent in both the construction activities and financing of the project. Bill enjoyed his time in the house as an active, he felt strongly that all should 'pay it forward' for future generations of Penn Staters who would become KDRZ's. He led by example. During the major construction phase of the project, he joined Project Manager Tom Fuchs '66 in living and working on-site as part of the sweat equity crew.

Fraternities at Penn State, in general, and KDR (and several others) in particular, have had a rough time maintaining existence during the university administration's aggressive (and some say heavy-handed) enforcement reactions due to a tragic pledging occurrence at another fraternity in 2017. In the Sixties-Seventies, PSU had one of our country's largest Greek systems – 58 fraternities and 27 sororities. Today, those numbers are diminished; there now are 37 fraternities and 20 sororities.

As a Board member of the Zeta Alumni of Kappa Delta Rho, Inc., Bill was a staunch advocate of maintaining the Chapter house (for eventual re-colonization of Zeta Chapter) and re-energizing younger alumni to become involved in the governance and re-colonization processes. Along with Dusan Bratic '68, they patiently met with and cultivated outreaches to the younger cadres of alums. As a result, an inaugural KDRZ Golf Outing was organized and successfully held in May 2022. It was altogether fitting to designate this event as the "William F. Donadee Memorial Golf Tournament" memorialized via banner, photos and the Tree of Knowledge Trophy for permanent display in the Chapter house.

Bill Donadee exemplified the principals of "Honor Super Omnia" through his deeds and actions. He provided a second mortgage to Zeta during a major life & safety renovation. He also gave his time and comfort to other Brothers, friends and acquaintances. He supported local government and the environment. In the end he furthered the founding principles of "Honor Super Omnia" by forgiving the substantial second mortgage in his will. We will all miss him.

In summation, it is apt to paraphrase a writing by KDR Brother Ken Beckley, Nu'62, which appeared in a recent Quill and Scroll cover story: "Kappa Delta Rho is a special Brotherhood that forges lifelong relationships and Brothers helping Brothers." Bill Donadee exemplified such a man, using his multiple talents to assist not only his Brothers (and Brothers-to-be) but his family, friends and community during his well-lived life.



This is a great question, and a consistent question that we hear from alumni; particularly those that graduated in the 1980s and 1990s. As the Kappa Delta Rho Foundation makes it case for support with Alumni, we spend a lot of time discussing the transformation that the Fraternity and the Foundation have experienced. The answer is that the leadership programming and character development training of the Fraternity has evolved into an industry-leading platform, and the scholarship program of the Foundation has greatly expanded. Allow me to list some of the more significant pieces below.

With the help of Alumni funding through the Foundation, the National Office developed an online education programming platform that gives Chapters the flexibility to conduct their business and educational training online. While not developed with the expectation of a pandemic shutdown, the platform provided the mechanism for the Chapters to continue to operate when their colleges and universities were closing down and moving classes online. KDR retained 85%-90% of our Spring 2020 pledges, which far exceeded what most other Greek organizations experienced.

Officer training has expanded to help new officers transition into leadership roles within their Chapter. The Consul's Academy has existed for a number of years to provide a forum for education and shared ideas among the Chapter Presidents. That concept has been expanded through a platform called Optio to provide similar forums for Chapter Treasurers, Senior Tribunes, Junior Tribunes, and Secretaries.

The Fraternity has increased health and wellness support of our Membership through the Brothers' Keeper initiative and Capital Campaign. Brothers' Keeper is a multi-faceted program intended to develop positive physical and mental health behaviors and habits, and also to educate and

encourage Brothers to reach out for professional help for themselves or a friend when in distress. In addition, the campaign will eventually endow a full-time position in the National Office dedicated to the Health and Wellness of our Brotherhood.

The KDR Foundation has also seen a transformation over the past few decades. The endowed funds of the Foundation have grown from under \$200,000 in the early 1990s to approximately \$4.6 million today thanks to the generosity of our Alumni creating new scholarships and the time and energy of volunteers who helped execute several capital campaigns. The Foundation distributed well over \$100,000 in scholarships last year, including KDR's first needs-based scholarship, to over 125 deserving Brothers. Currently, sixteen of our Chapters have at least one endowed scholarship.

I can say with confidence that the services and resources provided by National Office and the Foundation far exceed the level that Chapters were provided several decades ago.

We have a number of Chapters that were founded in the 1980s and 1990s whose Alumni wonder how Kappa Delta Rho has changed since they graduated. I can say with confidence that the services and resources that are provided by National Office and the Foundation far exceed the level that Chapters were provided several decades ago, and the Foundation is working hard to raise the funds necessary to help our Brothers and our Chapters continue to succeed and prosper.

What Can My Fraternity Mean After Graduation?

After graduation, after a man has packed and traveled and unpacked, there comes a lull in the flurry, a time for review of what has just passed and for a glance at the future. Then, at first glance it appears to the graduate that he has stepped from one world into another, a strangely new world, where there are different interests and values. The two he thinks are practically separate and independent. He hastily concludes therefore that; he must put college out of his mind. Henceforth he is to be occupied with affairs unrelated to academic activities. And his consideration for college affairs in general has included his fraternity.

But a few moments later this young graduate is led by more ample experience to an altogether different conception as to the prominence his college interests are to have in his graduate life. Let us consider his fraternity, since we are particularly interested in that. What does it mean after graduation? It means in the solitude of a rainy fall evening the recollection of a great deal that is worth remembering. To live again the friendships, the comedy interspersed here and there with the serious—the jokes, the larks, the competitions, the debates, —this in and of itself a joyful experience with a value hard to estimate. The years lived in a "frat" house have without extravagance been called the "paradise period of life." As one fraternity man put it recently, "It was the time when everyone was a friend." These memories of fraternity life become more and more dear with the passing of time.

The really great significance of the college fraternity in after life most alumni find in its service as the initiator and nurse of friendships, formed in undergraduate days, which endure to the end of life.

It is not merely the fact that these friendships afford one of the finest pleasures known to man, but also the fact that these fraternities are often potent influences in shaping one's career, which make them factors little short of permanent importance. It is in this connection that the fraternity impresses itself most upon the graduate life of its members.

Another important meaning not often realized is the opportunity which the fraternity affords the graduate for service in an advisory capacity to the undergraduates. There is no college man who has not at some time been sharply conscious of the part his college training has played in determining his success and failures in after years. If there were some concerted effort to make this knowledge, so painfully acquired, available for undergraduate use there would result a more intimate and vital connection between the preparation for life and life itself. For the graduate there would result a prolonged acquaintance with youth, which is its own reward. It is hoped that this opportunity for the graduate and the undergraduate members of the fraternity to serve each other will soon be realized.



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
